

SPEECH AND DRAMA

GENERAL REGULATIONS

1 Examination Entries

Entry forms for examination should be completed by the teacher entering the candidates. Full names and age (if under 21) must be given. There are separate entry forms for diploma candidates.

2 Dates of Entry

Completed examination entry forms, with fees, must be received by the General Secretary four weeks before the date of examination.

3 Time Table

Where possible the teacher, in conjunction with the Examiner/Area Representative, should prepare a time table for the examination. A copy should accompany the entry form.

4 Late Entries

In special circumstances, teachers may submit one or two late entries for inclusion on an entry form already submitted. Such late entries will be accepted only if the Examiner's arrangements permit, and are subject to a late fee of £3.00 per candidate.

5 Entry Fees

A list of current entry fees is available from the General Secretary and is published on the website.

6 Non-Attendance

Candidates not attending examinations may forfeit their fees and right to be heard except in the case

of illness. In this case, if transfer to a later date is desired, proof of illness must be provided.

7 Age Limits

Candidates in Grades A and B must be under 12 years of age. The minimum age for Associate and Licentiate Performer candidates is 15 and for Teacher candidates 18.

8 Marks

The maximum mark awardable in Grades A to 7 is 100. In these Grades the pass mark is 65; merits are awarded as follows: 75 Pass with Distinction, 85 Pass with Honours, 90 Pass with First Class Honours. For Grade 8 the maximum mark is 150. The pass mark is 100; 120 is Pass with Distinction, 130 Pass with Honours, 140 Pass with First Class Honours. In Medal examinations the maximum mark is 100, and the pass mark is 80.

In Associate (Teacher) and Licentiate practical examinations the maximum mark is 150, and the pass mark 100. The Associate (Performer) requires a pass mark of 115 out of a possible 150.

In Speech subjects for Grade 8 and Diploma Examinations the maximum mark is 200 and the pass mark is 150. Merits for Grade 8 are 170 Pass with Distinction, 180 Pass with Honours, 190 Pass with First Class Honours.

The written theory papers which are part of Grade 8, Associate (Teacher) and Licentiate require a pass mark of 75 out of a possible 100 marks.

9 Teaching

The award of certificates and diplomas does not imply ability to teach.

10 Failure

Candidates failing to pass in any examination may re-enter within 12 months at half fee.

11 Examination Requirements

Only standard editions of music in the official lists may be used. Abridged or simplified editions are not acceptable. However, in Singing and Music Theatre examinations songs in keys more suitable for the candidate are acceptable.

Candidates/teachers should be careful to select contrasting solos from the published lists.

12 Music/Speech Publications

If candidates or teachers have difficulty in obtaining copies of the listed solos/recitals the General Secretary should be contacted.

Suggestions for alternative solos of similar standing will be considered.

13 Accompanists and Page-Turners

Candidates should make their own arrangements for accompanists (and pageturners) who will be allowed in the Examination Room only whilst actually accompanying. The candidate's teacher is permitted as accompanist/pageturner,

14 Exemptions from Theory Examinations

In Grades 1 to 7 inclusive Viva Voce questions are excused and an appropriate level of marks awarded to candidates who have passed the written Theory of Music examination of not more than two Grades lower than the practical examination. The Theory Examination Report Form must be produced.

Candidates who have passed the written theory requirement of the Associate (Teacher) Diploma will be exempt from the written theory section of the Licentiate Diploma examination.

DIPLOMA EXAMINATIONS IN SPEECH AND DRAMA

Associate Diploma (ANCM)

This examination is in two parts, written theory and practical. Both parts must be completed before the award is made.

Part I

Written Theory The theory paper will consist of four questions each	100 marks

- a All methods of breathing
- b Pace, pause, simple and compound inflection
- c The technique of voice production
- d Speech faults in a given phrase
- e The technique of radio and television speakers
- f The use of the microphone
- g The analysis of a given piece of verse

Fellowship Diploma (FNCM)

Candidates must have previously passed the Licentiate or examination of similar standard.

Candidates are required to perform a programme of 35 - 40 minutes duration.

The Examiner's Report will take the form of a critique. No marks as such will be awarded, and the result will be notified as successful or unsuccessful.

The programme requirements are as follows:

- 1 A social speech
- 2 A controversial speech
- 3 A humorous speech
- 4 A vocational speech
- 5 Two pieces of drama of candidate's own choice

MEDAL EXAMINATIONS

Examinations for Bronze, Silver and Gold Medals are held in all subjects. Details of requirements are as follows:

Junior Bronze

Two pieces of verse from the Grade 3 List One piece of prose of own choice of similar standard

Intermediate Bronze

Two pieces of verse from the Grade 5 List One piece of prose of own choice of similar standard

Intermediate Silver

Two pieces of verse from the Grade 6 List One piece of prose of own choice of similar standard

Intermediate Gold

One piece of verse from the Grade 7 List One piece of drama from the Grade 7 List One piece of prose of own choice of similar standard

Senior Bronze

One piece of verse from the Grade 8 List One piece of drama from the Grade 8 List One piece of prose of own choice of similar standard

Senior Silver

One piece of verse from the Associate List One piece of drama from the Associate List One piece of prose of own choice of similar standard

Senior Gold

One piece of verse from the Licentiate List One piece of drama from the Licentiate List One piece of prose of own choice of similar standard

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Please note that all Medal Examination Speech and Drama recitals must be performed from memory.

Marks

Marks are awarded as follows:Listed Recitals60Own Choice Recital20General Impression20

The pass mark is 80. No award of Honours or Distinction is made in the Medal Division but a high standard of performance is expected.

COLLEGE ROBES

ASSOCIATE (ANCM AND AMUSNCM)

- **Gown:** Plain black gown as London Graduates but with four pleats in the sleeve, and each sleeve having two bars of lavender finished to a point laid on each side of the pleats.
- **Hood:** Oxford simple shape, black outer faced inside cowl edge only with lavender. The plain neckband is black, lined with lavender.

LICENTIATE (LNCM AND LMUSNCM)

Gown: Exactly as for Associate.

Hood: Oxford simple shape, black outer fully lined with lavender. The plain neckband is black, lined with lavender.

FELLOWSHIP (FNCM AND FMusNCM)

- **Gown:** Plain black gown as London Graduates with facings of lavender and with four pleats in the sleeve, and each sleeve having three bars of lavender finished to a point laid on the centre and each side of the pleats. The centre bar is placed vertically with the others leaning outwards.
- Hood: Oxford simple shape, black outer fully lined with lavender. The cowl edge only is bound inside and out with white fur. The plain neckband is black, lined with lavender.

ALL DIPLOMA LEVELS

Hat: A mortar-board type cap, black with lavender button and tassel, is available for all levels of diploma, and is usually acquired when attaining Associate level.

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
